

RATHBUN FULLER RITES SATURDAY

Dean of Toledo Lawyers And Business Leader Succumbs at 80.

Rathbun Fuller, 80, dean of Toledo lawyers and a leading Toledo business man, banker and industrialist for the last 50 years, will be buried in Woodlawn cemetery tomorrow following services at 3 p. m. in the home in the River road near Perrysburg.

Mr. Fuller died shortly after noon yesterday after having been in failing health for 10 years.

He was the second son of the late Gen. John W. Fuller, Civil war hero and pioneer Toledo resident.

Educated in the public schools, Mr. Fuller attended the law school of the University of Michigan for two years but because of a depression that developed left the university in his sophomore year. Returning to Toledo, he began reading law in the office of Haynes, Potter & Beckwith, one of the leading firms of the day. He was admitted to the bar in 1879.

From 1881 to 1888 he was a member of the law firm of Collings & Fuller, during which time he served as deputy clerk of the U. S. district court and later as a U. S. commissioner. He then joined the firm of Swayne, Hayes, Fuller & Tyler. Upon the deaths of N. H. Swayne and Birchard Hayes, Mr. Fuller continued in the law business under his own name with offices in the Second National Bank building.

Mr. Fuller was a member of Delta Kappa Epsilon fraternity and also a member of the Ohio Society of New York, the Toledo lodge of Elks, the Toledo club, Chamber of Commerce, Inverness and Country clubs, the American and the Toledo Bar associations, and other organizations.
