

Dr. Willis S. Peck

Area Radiologist For 30 Years

Dr. Willis S. Peck, 74, a Toledo area radiologist for more than 30 years, died Monday in his home, 6533 Abbey Run, Sylvania.

A native of Pulaski, N.Y., he was graduated from Syracuse University, where he received his medical degree in 1924. He served his internship at the Hospital of the Good Shepherd in Syracuse in 1925.

Dr. Peck was a general practitioner in Syracuse for several years before going to the University of Michigan, where he received radiology training and was an instructor and associate professor of radiology from 1928 to 1939.

Dr. Peck was also director of radiation therapy at the University of Michigan from 1937 to 1939.

Formed Partnership

In 1939, he and Dr. Murray Goodrich formed a partnership in radiology in Toledo, which grew to become the Toledo Radiological Associates. Dr. Peck retired as a radiologist in 1972.

He was director of the radiation department at Toledo Hospital from 1962 to 1967. Dr. Peck was also an emeritus staff member at Toledo, Riverside, and Flower hospitals.

Dr. Peck also did radiology work at hospitals in Fremont, Sandusky, Port Clinton, and Adrian, Mich.

Since his retirement, Dr. Peck had been conducting cancer research at Toledo Hospital.

He was a former vestryman and senior warden at St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Maumee. He recently served as chairman of the congregation's preservation fund and trustee of its welfare fund.

He was a diplomat of the American Board of Radiology, a fellow of the American College of Radiology, a past president of the Ohio State Radiological Society, and a member of the Lucas County Academy of Medicine, the North American Radiological Society, and the American Roentgen Ray Society.

Dr. Peck was also a member

of the Northwest Radiological Society, American Radium Society, Toledo Rotary Club, Toledo Club, Pi Kappa Alpha social fraternity, Ottawa Skeet Club, and Trout Unlimited. He was also president of the Stonehenge Condominium Association, and former trustee of Maumee Valley Country Day School.

He was recently honored for long-time service at Flower and Toledo hospitals.

Surviving are his daughters, Mrs. Mary Gallaway and Mrs. Jo Ann Dansard, and six grandchildren.

Services will be at 11 a.m. Saturday in St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Maumee. The body will be in the Bennett Mortuary after 6 p.m. Friday.
